



Cliff cleverly turned out a Lockheed proposal for a Flying Bomb from



Look! Lily and I are both witness to the shocking Truth, Frank Babbitt actually WORKING on his






Lily had everyone held rapt giving us her impending "BAD" news ©

of the two entrants of "Double Dutch "Club Contest.

Originally planned to be sponsor by MIRANDCO, and rules stated only "non winners from TC-9" or FINISHED new builds eligible to win, reality and good fortune did come to pass here.

Reality, in that fact only two entries made it to meeting, one unfinished but a new build, the other, winner of an award at "Soldier of Orange" Dutch themed TC-9. Contest Director Burton determined himself with a healthy response of "that's the ticket" from those present, that best course was Executive Action here. A decision by Judge (Burton) to award First Place to the lovely Dutch East Indies Air Force Martin 139 (as designation of export model of B-10 was known), Second to WIP Dutch AF F-16. Jim Priete, Randy Ray got 10 dollar awards provided by sponsor and new Free Hornet Eric Lenk, via Burton. The last award goes

back into the funds until next Hornets Club Contest, which MIRANDCO cosponsors now. This was announced already, April and theme "Thunder & Lightning".




Now, last but not least, Mick Burton had some WIP to put on the Model Talk Table.

On the left, Monogram 1/48th F-80C now sporting a Tamiya AS-14 Silver finish. Planning as Korean War.


The companion "Shooting Star" on right is Academy T-33A, currently planned as Luftwaffe camo schema.







One last 1/48th Lockheed product that he has underway is this Academy P-38J Lightning. Plans to do it with an aftermarket decal sheet have changed, but no matter. In the out of the box scheme, still will work for Burton's plan for a Pacific Theatre of Operations collection.





There's a touch of maritime in the mix, the Yuba City show this summer provided a decently priced Polar Lights reissue of the Aurora mold "SEAVIEW" along with a Skyhook Models conversion set in resin. For what? Why, to update to the later season version with "The Flying Sub", yes.



Finally rounding out the work in process and still in a nautical vein, here's FineMolds D4Y-1 "Judy" in 1/48. Another OOB project, for a reason.

Finish so far is in IJN Green topside using Testors Acryl, underside is light Gray FS 36495 in same series. Not visible in the picture but when his build article comes along, the out of box mismatch of horizontal tailplanes at the fuselage joints will be shown, noted. Basically otherwise, model comes out superbly well in all aspects out of the box, provides D4Y-1 or D4Y-2 opts.

Before meeting end, Burton announced the Gruppe Build 2014 package so More about that in a moment...President Mike Woolson awarded MOM.





FIRST Model of the Month for 2014 Award to Free Hornet Chris Bucholtz!





OK, yes. Perhaps some don't quite recognize this rare aircraft he modeled here.

A very significant vehicle in many ways both in "world history" and personal history for several of us. The Curtiss F9C-2 "Sparrowhawk", in USS Macon markings. The actual aircraft today lies submerged off coast of Monterey along with its brethren, where USN Airship ZRS-5 USS Macon went down February 12, 1935, with 70 crew onboard, of which only two were lost, thankfully.

Chris has been working on this model from the Pegasus kit for many years, and a good portion of this build is his work alone, replacing or reworking many items. The engine is an aftermarket item as well, itself requiring a good amount of effort. Originally being finished for donation to the Seattle Museum of Flight, it will now more appropriately remain home with Chris. Magnificent work here, CB. — fini mb
