RACEPLANE IN MINIATURE MAY BE RARA AVIS TO SOME BUT NOT TO "RED"



"AMERICAN JET" F8F-2 Grumman Bearcat Modeled in 1/48 Scale Text & Photos by: Rodney J. "Red" Williams



I'll start out with a very colorful model for 2014 which is a ¼ scale plastic model, (a replica) of the real Bearcat fighter plane that was revised into a racing aircraft.

Shortly after I joined a local San Jose, California model club known as "San Jose Scale Modelers" I joined "International Plastic Modelers Society," (IPMS/USA), including none other than this air race society called "S.A.R.H." All of this transpired in early 1984. HEY, it's my 30th anniversary, WOW!!

As a young kid in the 1930's I became a "rubber-band" model builder flying my creations from the top of my parent's California style flat roof home in Portage Lakes, Ohio. We lived out in the country, about seven mils south of Akron.

This town was the "Rubber Capitol" of the world and was the new home of Goodyear Aircraft Corporation, better known as "GAC." This company became famous near the end of WW2, as it designed and produced the most famous and then "fastest" fighter plane that the world had ever known at the time in the history of mankind.

Yes indeed, we are speaking about the "FG-1 to the F2G-1D Corsair" aircraft. The big bomb was dropped on the "Japs" and the war ended in 1945, thus the F2G version never saw combat action. However, it became famous and saw lots of "peace-time" action during the Cleveland, Ohio National Air Races, (1947-1949).

My "air-racer" model building took off in 1986 by converting a 1/32nd scale Revell F4U-1A kit to Cook Cleland's #57 F2G-1D racer.



As years went by, I built all of the F2G racing airplanes then got into building some P-51D and F8F Bearcat racing models in the late 1990's and in the 21st Century.





"THE MODEL BEGINS"

While visiting the "San Antonio Hobby Shop" that was then located near San Francisco, CA, I bought the following book:

"RACING PLANES and Air Races" – A Complete History by Reed Kinert – VOLUME IV REFERENCE SERIES No. 1, (1946-1967). This book was published by: AERO PUBLISHERS, INC. of Fallbrook, California and cost a whopping USD \$4.95 in 1985. The © for this book is 1968.


On the back cover of "Vol-IV" it states that Reed had produced other racing books that covered the racing community: Volume-I, (1909-1923), Volume-II, (1924-1931), Volume-III, (1932-1939).

Volume-IV inspired me to build some of the other racers that flew during the early "heydays" of the Reno, Nevada Air Shows. The model companies that manufactured the plastic injected molded kits, however, only made the fighter versions.

It is easy for an experienced modeler like me to "convert" a fighter into the racing version.

However, the "big" problem in the last part of the 20th Century was the "RACING DECALS."





Darryl Greenamyer was back for his final appearance in the famous Bearcat, "Conquest I" now sponsored by American Jet Industries and wearing its most attractive paint scheme ever. However, after being the top qualifier, there were problems. (John Tegler)

In 1989 I spent USD \$150.00 for a set of decals for my 1:32nd scale P-51D Mustang named "HI TIME-II." The price for the model kit in those days was about 10-12 American dollars.



I had always wanted to build the F8F-2 Bearcat named "American Jet" but I could not find



anyone to make the decals at a more reasonable price.



In late 2005 I saw a notice posted on one of the modeling web sites that a company by the name of "Hi Planes" down in Australia, was making an injected plastic F8F-2 kit with "AMERICAN JET" decals.

I do not recall the price of the kit, but that did not matter. We modelers get into this syndrome:

"I GOTTA HAVE THAT KIT!!"

"NO MATTER WHAT AND THE PRICE DOES NOT MATTER."

Today, January 24, 2014 I retrieved some left over F8F-2 Bearcat parts from my "spare parts box". So I see that I bought two of these kits and I'm searching my memory bank to see why I bought two kits, but I'm coming up with a blank answer.

The enclosed building photos show a real dilemma in building this kit. Most of the cockpit parts, including parts like the wheels, wings and fuselage




I experimented with all the cockpit parts and made some new ones, then I used a mix-match of both kits to produce a nice looking model. As model building goes, the cockpit, wheel wells and engines are the most




important parts of any airplane, so they should look "realistic." I'm letting most of the photos tell the building story.












































I painted the model with Tamiya Acrylic Paints.

The model's main color was X-8 Gloss Yellow.

The orange prop color was achieved by mixing gloss red with some gloss yellow so it looked similar to the color of the kit decals,








I let the paint dry for a week or more then sprayed on some "Future Floor Wax" which will give the gloss yellow a bit more glossy look to it.

A week or two later the model was ready to be decaled. We "modelers" cut out each decal and soak it in clean water and within a minute or so, the decal is ready to slide off of the special made decal paper and onto the model at its proper location. The kit instructions show you where the decal (s)


should go. If you have real photos of the aircraft then it will show the decal placement too.



Alas, with all work performed, I started to decal the finished model and to my "astonishment" these new decals started to break apart into very tiny pieces, (like a few dozen).

I did my best on trying to get the decals on model, and close up the gaps due to the decals breaking apart, but it really looked *BAD*.

I have had this problem with very old decals but "NEVER" with new decals. I stopped the decaling process and removed the few decals that were on the model.

I emailed the company in Australia and they sent me a new set of decals. To be safe I coated these new decals with our old modeler's stand-by water-clear "Future Floor Wax," which usually holds old decals together.

The newer decals presented no problem back in 2006. I just went out to my model display case that is located in our living room and looked at the model. It looks like brand new, even though it was built 8 years ago.

You will note that the windscreen/canopy is one small unit and when you look into the model you see next to nothing in the cockpit, so why go to the bother to make an accurate cockpit?

The answer is: We modelers know it's there!

As the story goes we in "photojournalism" say: If you speak about something, it's best to show a photo of it, if you have one.

On the other side of the coin, many times you can display a photo, which tells the story and you do not need to enclose any narration.







In closing I have added a photo of my #57 F2G racer and an image of my third P-51D "Hi Time-II model. (Now showing at the start of the article – Ed.)



Hornet's Valentine's Surprise Nest (a look back from The Front)



The pair are both 1/32 scale, from the "Golden Age" of American plastic Scale Modeling, the late 1960s to mid 1970s. That is Revell's McDonnell F-4J Phantom, definitely vintage "thirty two scale" material. Cliff Kranz's enthusiastic and soon to be realized final plan here is to have this bird hanging from ceiling pipes of the school work shop where he spends his days, in triumphant pursuit of a NVAF MiG-21 Fishbed D in the same locale, scale. The triumphant part comes in by virtue of the 1/32 scale AIM-9 Sidewinder missile model about to enter aforesaid MiG's tail pipe.

aerial ballet display plans solve elegantly one of the worst features of this I and plenty of others have found with the kit. Namely, the main gear legs tend to "bow" over time, simply from the "out of the box" weight of the model (no nose weight required) If you ever used aftermarket resin cockpit...good luck!
