
just "Egg Planes" as here we have some 1/35 Armored Vehicles seriously being enjoyed.

She ended up getting her Mustang DONE, even learned how use of super glue worked to save some broken parts in process © (Their mom is a chemist, so this was a bonus for me when we

### A THREEPEAT, RELAXING WITH RUSSIAN ARMOR IN SCALE, BY RW

LAST ISSUE OUR MAN "RED" WILLIAMS TOOK BREAK WITH TWO 1/72 RUSSIAN TANKS. 3rd TIME's A CHARM HEY? Text & Photos by: RJ Williams © June 10, 2014



"RUSSIAN ARMORED PERSONNEL CARRIER – BTR-60P"

I was surfing Squadron's sale items not long ago and ran across this little gem, which is made by a company called ICM

The instructions do not relate to this 72nd scale model as to what the "BTR-60P" represents. (BTR stands for *Bronetransporter*, literally "armoured transporter", the -60 is model number, the P was the first version produced, with an open roof. 60PA, PA-1, PB and other versions followed - *Editor*)



There is next to no "flashing" on any of the parts. The quality of the castings is excellent.









The tires are made up of two halves per tire with next to no flashing and they fit together A-OK. I had to lightly sand the tire seams with new 400 grit 3M sandpaper.







A well crafted machine gun and/or maybe it's a 20mm cannon type of gun was supplied in the kit and with a bit of sanding it received its coat of "gun-metal" paint.












There are several parts to the vehicle's interior which go together very good. I attached the interior benches and driver's compartment then painted this section of the model with my alive group point.

with my olive green paint.








The top section of the vehicle was glued to the lower part of the model, then I sanded the seam lines.

I attached all of the items to the sides and top of the exterior section of the model.

As I started to attach the three .015" diameter cross braces, I broke two of them. So I had to make all new ones, using Evergreen's .020" diameter white rod.



Again, my shaky hands broke a few of the finely crafted "U" type handhold bars, so I used some of my brass rod and made new ones.



I bought "lots" of the rod in the 1980's at the Train Shop in Santa Clara, CA. This rod came in sizes as small as .006" diameter and up to .028" in diameter.


It is made by: "HO DETAIL-ASSOCIATES." P.O. Box 107 Santa Maria, CA 93454.

If this company is still in business I assume you can still buy the stiff wire at the Train Shop and/or try the web.

The box-art shows that a thick wire cable was attached to the left side of the vehicle. However, "ICM" did not supply the cable.

I searched my spare-parts box and came up with some "ship rigging rope" so I used a short piece of it. It was painted with my steel paint and was attached to the model on final assembly.





I doubled checked everything to make sure that it was "done" and ready for the paint shop, (out in our garage).





I used a sand-looking color along with my green paint and did a bit of a "camo" paint job.





The dried paint was gloss coated with some Future, then I added the kit decals, then more Future.

Later, it was sprayed with Microscale's dull coat.

The base was made out of 1/4" foam board.

I then added some model grass, also some local "Dolores River" sand and gravel.










I recommend this kit for its' simplicity, to anyone who wants to add some armor models to their collection.

The scheme is pretty although yes, pretty basic. The overall finish is that spectacular solution in a spray can, Tamiya's AS-14 Airframe Silver. The "International Orange", flat black, both in favorite media of mine, namely Testors Acryl line. Well behaved, easily brushed or sprayed,

Primary reason this particular model caught my eye there at High Rollers show then to consider getting, it was a package deal. Academy T-33A, Monogram F-80C, and a Korean War F-80s decal sheet, all for TWENTY DOLLARS. Seller wasn't even going to consider breaking the set up and at that price, knew if I didn't take, no doubt someone else would soon.

Well, although "The Beer City Special" on Korean sheet was my original plan for this kit, by the time I had gotten this mostly underway, pretty much made my mind up that I'd have to wait to try that one.

Saw the May 2014 "The Eighties" SVSM Editor's Club Contest was still just in reach, if I completed this model, for my entry. Long ago at what was then SJSM, successfully snagged at a Saturday afternoon auction an earlier pressing of this same F-80, with an old Microscale decal sheet featuring local color. What's local color or all this to do with that, ask?




