art collectors alike. Volume has a gallery of Charles R. Knight's work in "Parade of Life Through The Ages", as the feature which has built this following and lucrative result. Interestingly as well, it's also where the NG "1942 Theatre of War in the Pacific Ocean Map" made a first appearance, you can buy that for 29.95 in laminated form these days. Just so you all now know, too. Along with fact you can obtain a *digital copy* of this pricey old mag in a CD or DVD collection, fairly close to "going price" of the original print editions. That option so includes then a complete set of all the OTHER issues over the years that modelers have used for references! And the maps...







Okay, I'll map our way out of this eddy o' mine. On the left, a gorgeous profile book brought by Kent McClure, who may have known what one of these other modelers was up to! Which sometimes can be easy for me to find,





as I cruise about the room during our time, shooting pictures candidly. See, Cliff's there, smiling. Don't think my work is all smiles and free access...

As you might note, Kelli has developed a sudden close interest in her project, Gabriel Lee follows her lead with a "spruesome grimace", Kent's now intensely focused on his detail work here.

With a gleeful reminder of how styrene plastic is tougher than flesh. However, we'll start here anyway.



For a look at what some of you are building! Mike resumed his his actual gleeful serious work on this, a 1/72 scale conversion of the Hasegawa S2F ASW Grumman "Tracker". Of course, since it's Mike, it has to become a FireFighting Aircraft with all this.



The Draw Decals in view with the conversion parts, reveal the exciting final results will be a Cal Fire S-2 T "Turbo Tracker". Go MIKE!



Next up, Chris Bucholtz, who stepped away just long enough for me to take these pics. Perhaps his neighbor two seats down will lend him that MiG book we saw earlier, hey?






Kent McClure channels "King Kong" with his current project, an exotic female character. A picture of lady in question is visible in the yellow box.





Gabriel Lee had a veritable universe of models underway. In his hands, export version night attack helicopter the Mi-35M "Hind E". Fuerza Aerea Venezola markings will be likeliest of schemes for this one, my bet.

In his working in process stacks, we find Gabriel has: Space 1999 "Hawk" spacecraft in 1/72 by MPC. Arii's re-release of the LS molded Bede BD-5 & BD-5J in 1/72. Airfix new mold F-51D postwar Mustang in 1/72, accompanied by Hasegawa's US Pilots / Ground Crew Set. The Star Wars 1/72 TIE Fighter in 1/72 by Fine Molds, a Douglas DC-9 fill out his contingent.



One could speculate on Cliff's baleful gaze here, parked as he is under his cap from now long ago IPMS SemiCon Nats of 1998. But I think he knows, we can be proud of our performance under pressure that brought about that event. Yet to be matched, much less topped, in R-9. But not for lack of trying, in varying degrees of attempts.

Frank Babbitt is catching up on an item he first launched when we had theme for a Gruppe Build of "Eyes in the Sky". His RF-84F Thunderflash, 1/48 scale Heller kit is very likely another award winner when Frank's done deciding final schema



BONUS FEATURE -aka Post Scripting

You may have noticed (or not), that in having a bit of sport with everyone, that no actual information given about the specifics of what and whose models those were.

Or that in fact, at least in one case, humorous titling of "*Unimaginable Horror*" was pretty much the actual correct designation for the model in question. Also way to accurately sum up the author and his legendary works, even for his adherents!

First things first though. These very well rendered pieces were done by our Kent McClure, and for their true scale you should look bottom right. I enjoyed how the pictures cropped and scaled up, and lent themselves to a bit of editor's mischief.



The "Blue Violet Violence" (my reference) is based on the works of American Horror Writer, Howard Phillips (HP) Lovecraft (1890-1937), whose writings often refer in darkly hinted or manner directly to "unimaginable horror, unspeakable things beyond the comprehension of mere mankind" that, of course, were never to be loosed in our universe by vain, foolish men, or those whose curiousity exceeded that which he considered proper boundaries. (No foil hats in his size, I guess)

Take a compare of him to the Shark!



Tough call on which would be a better match for illustrating "a cold fish" or, an unspeakable horror... (*like his texts*)





Now all my tales are based on the fundamental premise that common human laws and interests and emotions have no validity or significance in the vast cosmos at large. To me there is nothing but puerility in a tale in which the human form—and the local human passions and conditions and standards—are depicted as native to other worlds or other universes. To achieve the essence of real externality, whether of time or space or dimension, one must forget that such things as organic life, good and evil, love and hate, and all such local attributes of a negligible and temporary race called mankind, have any existence at all. Only the human scenes and characters must have human qualities. These must be handled with unsparing realism, (not catch-penny romanticism) but when we cross the line to the boundless and hideous unknown—the shadow-haunted Outside—we must remember to leave our humanity and terrestrialism at the threshold.

"DRIVING DOWN MEMORY LANE AT THE RUBBER BOWL" 1/25th Scale Kurtis Midget Racer No. 27 by Revell Built by: Rodney J. Williams © June 23, 2014

I was born in Akron, Ohio in 1931 and the "Rubber Bowl" stadium was built in 1939 next to our city airport. Several events started to appear at the Rubber Bowl after WW-II was over in 1945. One special event came to the bowl in the summer time around 1947 and it was "Midget Car Racing."



My cousin Jimmy came to live with us after he got out of the Navy in 1945. His best friend Ed from Alliance, Ohio came over and entered his racer in the events.

Somehow, cousin Jim learned how to drive Ed's racer and a year or so later I was able to drive Ed's car in the races. I was somewhere around 17 years old.


Wow, what a thrill it was to become a part time race driver.

In early 2014 I was surfing the model web sites and found this gem of a racer and "I JUST HAD TO HAVE IT."

Upon arrival, the kit was opened for inspection. I just had to start building,

There are a bit more than a dozen steps in the building process and number one was the engine, which went together extremely well.

as it had next to no flashing, sink marks or other regular kit imperfections.







Next came the chassis, its tubular frame and the bottom pan as they call it, which fit nicely together.


The radiator was glued to the front of these parts.

In Step Three I added the front and rear axles. These parts were pre painted before assembly and the pre-painted engine was installed.










Other pre-painted parts were also attached to the frame, such as a so named front and rear "NERF" bars, the seat, steering wheel, etc.

A few photos show several painted parts that are ready to be installed. Of course, like all modelers, these parts were dry fit by me prior to painting.







The tires were attached to their "chrome-plated" rims and then attached to the axles. I had a bit of adjustment to make on one rear axle shaft, as the tire did not set properly on my table.



The kit decals went on the model with no problems and the model was done.

In Step-14 there is a "trailer" to be built for the racer and it shows a '50 Ford F-1 pick up truck that you could buy and build, then attach the trailer to it. The racer can be glued to the trailer bed but that never happened. My model sits on a sand base. I still have the trailer parts and maybe I should "BUILD IT" and put the model on it.

Conclusion: This model brought back some good memories of my teenage years of life.

I found a few images on the web of the "RUBBER BOWL" and the real Midget racers, so I have included them in my story.

Did I help win any of the races for cousin Jim and Ed? (maybe!!)








