



Members of the rare tribe of "those who get it done" for our Region 9, more than just once or twice over the years.

Free Hornets were there in depth that summer Saturday,

and what follows is a blatantly selfish look back from President Burton, mood buoyed by having been there as participant.





Contest venue was new, cafeteria of Fresno City College. Which you can see here and in following shots, certainly provided a well lit, easily navigated forum with comfortable atmosphere. This modeler at least, hopes they will stage another show here and sooner than in a four year cycle, if at all possible. Nice place!





Themed as "World War One", this year being the midpoint of that momentous point in human history in centenary way as it now 100 years in past to date, may be tendency to expect "topical turnout"

Well as several other Contest Directors besides me could assure you, themes are great marketing tools but hardly reliable for predicting actual model demographic you will have. This event was another to reinforce that empirical finding, but that is not a slam, only an observation.

HIGH FIVE in fact, to Ernie Gee, Larry Fahrenbacher and the FSM team for this whole endeavor, for here you see result in "modern tech terms". A nice turn, the Fresno College sponsoring part of this, a nice "up front" display how the CADD

certification/degree technology program provides linkage to our hobbies in several ways today more than ever. Ernie's a prolific 3-D modeler in his own right, with his business. Another prolific "3-D modeler" of "old school" was at the show you see at left, Paul Fisher with some of his great hits.





Greatest Hits is going to be more or less the "theme" of this photo essay, as your Editor & Free Hornets Prez selfishly focuses on some of what





I found delightful at this well hosted, well run and well appreciated "end of summer model show" Like these two larger looks at some of Paul Fisher's "latest hits". The "two holer Meatbox" (one rude but affectionate nickname for two seat Gloster Meteors) in 1/32 is just, awesome. A nearby Curtiss high wing monoplane fighter in same scale, provides nice contrast and good look at "gold/chrome yellow" with blue scheme.





Now, a couple more looks at the venue, as I have become a true aficionado of show rooms as years go by.

Those flags of the world, actually a pleasing touch, a break for the eye. Now, *the tables*.





On left, the OUT OF BOX turnout by mid morning was pretty good in variety. Above, Larger than 1/48<sup>th</sup> Prop actually ended up doing A LOT better than 1/72 SE Prop, which you can see directly below (2)

Keep in mind, that's TWO. The "skeletonized and opened" Tempest on lower left, IS DISPLAY ONLY (and a vivid, well executed piece at that) ©





1/48 SE Prop visible top half on left, had 5 entries by shooting time, and the Quarter Scale Multi Engine Jets were virtually an overrun in compare to all the aforemention

Fun having a A-5 Vigilante next to MiG-25 as some speculate they were "related". *NOT* 

Back to the matter at hand (tables, and their relative population). I would bet not many "regulars" (attendees to the contest circuit) recall any shows in which the HYPOTHETICAL turnout outdid the 1/72 aircraft in Single Engine categories at the very least. Well, perhaps it was just by one, but hey sorry, at least there were 3 worthy competitors for that underappreciated category AT THE REGIONAL, while the "popular old standard" was short.







ROTARY WING was another "virtual overrun" again in compare to the aircraft categories normally outdoing entry counts. Sweet variety there, a WW2 Focke Wulf "Achgelis" in front, a current combat drone behind it, USCG Jayhawk, Russki coax rotor, others to make it a truly eye catcher



FICTIONAL SPACE VEHICLES above, again a MAJOR Blowout of entries. Category 44 on the above right, "Misc Media" shared space with the "Unfinished" Category, BOTH OF THEM outdid again, SE Prop Aircraft in 1/72 and 1/48 for turnout. (yes, a editorial razzzzz)

Below, another shared table and superb entries. Towed Artillery and Post 1945 AFVs definitely had "shown the flag" for the Regional, very well.



That 1/35 scale combat bulldozer really caught my eye and I will have another single item shot later to bring up some of the attraction. Meantime, a high five goes to Free Hornet Peter Long here, as I believe that is his that day award winning PanzerHaubitze 2000 above right of the 'dozer.

"Ultimate Sabre", the FJ-4B Fury in 1/48<sup>th</sup>, simply Sierra Hotel, with Bullpup.



Below is incontrovertible evidence (if you didn't see him already in my photos), of Free Hornet alum David (Muroc Models) Newman,



a 1/144<sup>th</sup> scale Lockheed F-5 Lightning (recce bird). For model size in compare, consider this could actually shade under the FJ-4B ...



Yet another unexpected excitement, an actual injected molded kit of the Beriev "Chaika" turboprop maritime combat amphib.



This Editor recalls how once to get this bird, someone kitbashed an Emily, two CF-100s and a lot of magic (hard work). 40 yrs later, you can buy kit.







Still in shock over that Be-12 in 1/72, a magnificent build of nice kit, I recovered with shooting the Stars here. Ever since beginning to build models, have had fancy for Lockheeds of all shapes and sizes. The grey and red/orange 1/48 "T Bird" T-33A Shooting Star, just sumptuous. If I recall correctly, placed near or at First in its category at end of day.

Finally, I had a chance take a set of decent 'low altitude and low crowding' pictures of this: Bob Philips' sweet rendering in 1/32 scale of Lockheed P-80C from Korean War, "Beer City Special"



To appreciate sufficiently what you're seeing here, I will advise you this, as the TriCity 12 Contest Director I'd be "in space" to have a table at my show like this.

Not all obvious why this is my reaction, so here's more I have kept "paper model" categories in TriCity for a little while now, and also make sure "Real Space" is separate as well. Fresno's Regional did same, and it is PAPER Rocketry you're seeing in full abundance, a great table of fine works.

That group includes all the Mercury, Gemini, Apollo vehicles, not visible here is the Lunar Rover also paper

Above right, that Russian Heavy is a T-35. All broken out, really a treat. Entry in Pre-1945 AFV 1/35, Axis cat.

In Softskin Military Vehicle 1/35, this 10 wheeled heavy tractor towing a M4 on transport trailer also something not often seen by me.





Having tried my hand years ago at several semi tractor trailer models in 1/25, I always appreciate the kind of effort it takes to carry off these at all. These two "conventional tractors with Aerodyne sleeper cabs" are no small undertaking by themselves. Beautiful pieces, entirely with trailer/loads.





This Tupelov Tu-2T "Bat" Russian torpedo bomber in 1/48 was quite an eye candy hit with many of us, and likely set several off to find the kit!



This F3H-2M McDonnell "Demon" in 1/48<sup>th</sup> scale, is quintessential deadly beauty, bristling with missiles and purpose. GO NAVY!











Not only were these very fine models to look at, I had to get these shots to assist me in possible illustrations for Fremont Hornets TC 12 show coming in September. I am sponsoring "Best Dreadnought" as a Special Award, and this USS Iowa, Tirpitz and early SMS Konig (1911-13 period) class all perfectly capture the essence of that.



Back for another look at two more Paul Fisher gems, in 1/32, classic Americana now. The very recent release of his Bell X-1A has definitely peaked a lot of renewed interest in American X-planes. How anyone could not fall in love with the Ryan PT/ST on first sight, on right, still escapes me.





A trusting soul, Paul. Apparently no one tipped him to NEVER leave his table unmanned, as the likes of these two "shifty types" may show up and be having lunch on your territory! A noted (and notorious) X-plane builder, Jim Priete is giving me the evil eye as likely he had his on that X-1A!




Mike Meek is pretending not to notice me taking the picture, in background. Below, a look at Jim's award winning PV-1N in 1/72 scale. Congrats you pirate





Again, more evidence that David Newman was at the Regional (all the way from Rosamond, CA). His recent addition to the Muroc Models resin kit wonder factory, his Curtiss Flying Boat in  $1/72^{nd}$  scale glory. Another splendid example in 1/1 and model scale of American excellence, oh yes.



As is Paul Fisher's aftermarket items for doing justice to Heller kitting of designer Kelly Johnson's Lockheed made magnificence, the Constellation



For some, it's just about the building of models and relaxing. For others, like me, it's also steeped in history, romance, technology and sheer awe. ©





All of which is splendidly and sweetly wrapped up in this, a model of a model!

Seen here in the light and "dark side of the moon" magnificence, the "Luna" rocket of *Destination Moon*. This 1950s movie was made in all seriousness, to illustrate perils and promise of Space Travel which was a very very new technology aborning in the postwar world, still adjusting to the terrible double edged sword of modern rocketry and applications of atomic physics.

The movie is pretty well respected now as a true worthy effort in itself from many an angle, cinematic, dramatic, pop culture and of course, Movie Special Effect modelling.

Typically, *MANY*, *MANY* models of the craft from movie progeny of that pioneer film have come to be available and then be "collector items" or "sought after reissues" long before kits (decent or otherwise) ever were to show up for this trailblazer.

Thanks to the beautiful execution of this modeler here, I think you can get the edge of my rant here, how overlooked and with blissful perhaps ignorance of the disrespect it embodies.

But then, I am an old radical and movie buff, so I'll take up arms for what others will consider trivial nonsense. That's fine.

Switching over to Real Space, modeler who had this Apollo-Soyuz Test Project made my day.

As did this Out of Box 1/48<sup>th</sup> XF2R-1 Dark Shark

My favorites now from Category 44, Mixed Media (other than Paper). This yellow auto wrecker with all its details, fixtures, look of purpose was fun

to peruse. I am not completely clear as to how much was scratchbuilt, but there's a LOT of work in this and I bet reference material wasn't "modeler friendly"



That was the subtitle to the last BUZZ, whereupon I shared four shots of the over 600 I took at Military Vehicle Preservation Association's 41<sup>st</sup> National Convention, held at Pleasanton Fairgrounds in August. Huge Thanks to gentleman modeler on the right, Mr Chris "Toadman" Hughes. Whose email to me in the early part of year left me no choice but to begin advertising on Hornets Website Calendar as to this special opportunity!

My deep appreciation as well to recently returned to us Hornets, Mr Richard Pedro, who made it possible for me to be at show.

Now, since I am space (size of saved PDF file) limited, I am going to share just a few more pictures here as I am at the absolute maximum for this issue already. But the theme of this "Special Issue" is "Summer Shows" and so it begs to be better illustrated than last issue's single page "funny".



This MVPA National show I had never been to, but I plan to rectify that in the future now that I have been here. Chris Hughes shared with me at the Event how they, like IPMS USA, move the shows from East to West over the years, but Portland is more often the choice for Western shows. So this Pleasanton event was a true rare treat. Now while this was "75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Jeep" for a theme, my choice of favorites has to be this, instead. I have never, ever, seen or heard of the 1941 Fiat SPA until I saw this one at the MVPA event. So you get to be bombarded here by a few shots now





Even though I have some other shots in detail of that SPA, I have several other favorites from this show that won't make this issue so here is at least another, and again the two shots I picked out of several I took. This is an "M1 Abrams optimized" Heavy Tank Transporter, privately owned. Called HETS (Heavy Equipment Transport System) and comprised of the M1070 8 x 8 Tractor plus M1000 semi trailer, all in all quite major highway filler




I don't know if any kit exists of this, but one should. The engineering is very cool and purposeful while coming off elegant, and the Museum that owns it, using it to bring vehicles besides itself to this show, had a very subtly engineered display placard set which imparted a wry sense of what it takes to own, maintain one of these beasts. Namely pointing out the "fun" of keeping spare tires on hand for the trailer and tractor, trailer having a multiple set of steerable "trucks" (ask a railroad modeler if you don't get the term) with like 40 tires total in set (plus the 8 for the tractor...) FUN!

Like the fun I had trying to publicize this event on Hornets calendar and in SVSM pubs I do, and learning many utterly missed notice entirely...

My thanks to Chris Hughes for giving me heads up and to those who paid attention to the public notices, congratulations you enjoyed great MVPA show
