
So, while we're co-opting Gabriel's air space anyways, let's get a gander at his current crop of projects in May.



Easier to work all angles, he doesn't need gloves for any handling to prevent marring of finished areas, steadier and sturdier platform when he's working on all of it.

Clearly, Dave needs to relax when working such detailed items, and next on below left, you'll see he certainly finds "easy pickings" to manage that. Keep in mind this is two weeks work...



FAIRCHILD/REPUBLIC A10 ... Designed around a 30mm GAU-8/A Gatling gun, the A10 THUNDERBOLT II has one goal, the destruction of armor. Firing at rates of 2100 or 4200 rounds per minute, the ground support aircraft packs a total of 1350 rounds, enough for 11 2 second bursts at maximum firing rate. A10 has a range of 2,160 miles plus air refueling capabilities. It carries one pilot as crew, has 2 TF34-GE-100 jet engines, each about 9,000 lbs thrust, and can loiter at low altitudes in tight turn situations for up to 2 hours. A10 can carry about 16,000 lbs of mixed ordnance in underwing pylons. Thunderbolt IIs are now operational in Europe.....




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WHAT'S NEXT!


