In past, KDMA Trophy has gone to a diverse range, i.e; "Fairey Rotodyne in USMC service (hypothetical)"; "Hot Rod Ice Cream Wagon (wheeled vehicle, other)" and "A heroic deep sea diver wrestling a huge Kraken to save a woman (scratchbuilt fully original art) in (Figures SciFi/Horror/Fantasy)" among others.



So competitive mastery must be met with equally creative mastery combined with some Durling-esque magic or luck, in best chance to "get the edge" here.

# SA 7 "Know A Hornet's Mighty Sting"

# KNOW A HORNET'S MIGHTY STING WARRIES FANDS AND AND ADDRESS Tri-City Twelve

## Award for Best American Fighter Aircraft





One of our Free Hornets, hereafter known as Sir Bob 1759, O.B.E. (Our Benefactor Extraordinaire) weary of all this model nonsense, retired from it to pursue other passions. Offered to provide some means to carry forth our mission, to be the Acme of Sarcastic Scale Modelling. If we actively promote our hobby, and share this opportunity for others to join us. Rather than be elitist, selfish and just plain crazy not to.

Failure to do this, not an option. That would be simply dishonorable, plus anger the Contest VP, whose generous friend this is. Against Bob's wishes but with his knowledge, I inaugurated this award in his honor at TriCity 8. Seems apropos enough, given how his absolute favorite subject in scale models or in history, is the American Fighter Aircraft. Especially those Curtiss Hawks...

In order to be eligible for this award, entry subject simply must be something <u>American Made</u>, tasked as a <u>Fighter</u> mission aircraft, even if it never actually was operated or served as one. Sorry, eligibility requirements *EXCLUDE* such otherwise worthy subjects such as Spitfires, Mosquitos, Fiat G.91 or similar American operated but not made here, craft. Don't forget, "Pursuit" designation = Fighter, also that USN & USMC operate fighters! Clarification: "hypothetical" or "paper designs" are eligible, as long as they are based on real proposals or project. Examples of these include the Republic P-69 or F-103, Bell P-59 or F-109, North American F-108 or Lockheed L-1000.





Further incentive; given the subject is not exactly a rare personal favorite (American Fighters): This Special Award remains as planned feature of

all future Fremont Hornets "annual contests". Regardless form they may take or themes otherwise selected.

So running out of steam to complete a "stinging" entry this year, still won't penalize you in vying for it next, in other words.




# SA 8 "Diamond In The Rough"

#### Award for

Best FINISHED Subject from the Worst Start

Basically this award is aimed to encourage everyone to try and finish that "hopeless diamond" (sorry, couldn't resist ) or simply an old dog of a subject from only kit available.

(SSP Kaimalino, a 1/700 scale SCRATCHBUILD)

However, an important distinction and "plot twist" to digest before you're going off saying "ho hum, just another way of giving a Silk Purse from a Sow's Ear trophy". That concept qualifies here, yes. YET NOT ONLY the standard "dreck into gold, from kits" will work for this plot device.

FOR THE CONTEST: Besides standard "bad kit, good finish", any SCRATCH BUILT (completely begun from raw materials) or MAJOR KIT BASHES (say no more than 30 percent of any single original kit left with a number of others or added scratchbuild parts to finish) or any MAJOR CONVERSIONS (aftermarket or scratchbuilt or kit bash of a subject from original start subtype to finish as another subtype) or any started from COMPLETE VAC FORM kit, ALL THESE FIT within intent of this award.




(1/72 VAC FORM KIT of Boeing KC-97G, no small feat to turn out)

# SA 9 "At Dawn's Early Light"

## Award for

Best PreHistoric or Early Man Subject

Admittedly by title alone, has nothing to tie into TC-13 theme. Still it is offered as a "signature Special Award" in Special Awards for TriCity Thirteen, for a fourth time since its inception in TriCity Ten, "Out of Africa". Yes, partly due fact Director is fan of Prehistory in all manner of ways, and truly, very few reward any who model it.



Yet oddly enough, there's plenty of Prehistoric material in Land Down Under. Particularly abundant for study of footprints!

No, The Director is not messing with you here or trying to trick you into a limited competitive focus. Just referring to how the serious scientific world reacts with amused glee at the relative wealth of "dinosaur trackways" spread throughout Oz, which is a stark contrast to the number of fossil "bones" (stones, in reality). Ratio is almost reverse of most other continents, really!

Award's "heritage" comes from obsession of the Contest Director and continues to be offered as means to provide "off the beaten path" modelers of these subjects another reason to do them, more importantly for he, to get them SHOWING them.

Prehistoric subjects OF ANYTHING (no need to try to interpret a *Muttabuttasaurus* (an iguanodont of OZ) or ankylosaur species named *Minmi*, though you're welcome to try if you like) for two means to be "thematically spot on". Anyone who's up to the cunningly more difficult than it sounds task of, modeling any fossil dinosaur tracks or trackways, be likely a VERY competitive entry against your brethren. Or a ticket to join some of us veteran model contest staff in our "special housing".

Of course, this award is not limited to only Oz or Kiwi related prehistoric items by any means. Merely a bonus and fun feature for focusing.

# SA 10 " 1917 "

# Award for Best of A Broad Class of Subjects within a notable Centenary



A significant Centennial in many respects, offers some ranges of model fun

As softball starting off, consider World War One now going into its FOURTH year for potential subject matter, in general and specific terms. Also: January 1917 sees the USA wrap up Campaign against Pancho Villa in a military expedition into Mexico, which will very soon in this year be recipient of "Zimmerman Telegram", helping to lead USA into WW1. In this month, one Manfred Von Richtofen gets "The Blue Max" for his success. February 1917, Zimmerman Telegram contents are shown to the US ambassador in UK. March 1917 sees the First Battle of Gaza, also Britain begins night bombing against targets in Germany with HP 0/100 planes. April would see USA go for declaration of war on Germany, beginning a US entry into WW1, also Second Battle of Gaza takes place this month. June of 1917 sees first fixed wing aerial bombing campaign by Germany on London. July is the start of Battle of Passchendale which takes place in Flanders fields and lasts for some time.November sees mounted ANZAC succeed in Battle of Ayun Kara against German rearguard. November also sees TANKS in use at Battle of Cambrai, while in December it is German use of Ground Attack aircraft which is credited with helping halt British advance here, bringing battle to an end.

That is just a simple and short synopsis, there is plenty of individual aircraft, vehicles, people who are significant and can be modeled from this year in the world. The **Russian Revolution begins in 1917**, and the Red & White forces alone create some pretty impressive numbers for things that can be modeled. Only a few minutes of research will also reveal a maritime role by **New Zealand in World War One in this year** which is useful. Along with other employment of ANZACs besides one noted in account above as an example. No need to be so specifically topical, it merely increases the range of possible award wins.

Simply Put: Eligible is any Figure, Aircraft, Armor, Auto, Diorama or simply subject, clearly extant during year 1917!

SPECIAL NOTE to SPARK some EFFORT here: TriCity Thirteen will feature PREPLANNED SPLIT

BIPLANES, FABRIC & RIGGING NOW IS TWO CATEGORIES, 5A & 5B, WHICH SPLITS OUT 1/32 & LARGER FROM 1/48 & SMALLER


# SA 11" Lightning Strikes Twice"

#### Award for

the Best Twin Engine Lightning







While not specifically linked to overall theme for TriCity Thirteen, Director doesn't preclude potentials for "wily game lawyering by hypothesis". So if you perhaps find "the real deal" for any or all of these dull or unchallenging, and you say, wish to explore what mayhaps an RAAF or Kiwi use of any or all of these would have ended up being, FEEL FREE, it will STILL BE ELIGIBLE (+ there's another "Special" to compete for, if you do)

For now, the simplest outlining of what is eligible, this: ANY SCALE and ANY VERSION of these listed AIRCRAFT:

English Electric Lightning, Lockheed Aircraft Lightning, Arado AR-234 "Blitz" (Lightning in German)

Take careful note, these are all "Twin Engined" designs at their outset, and all officially "Lightning" by name



As long as your subject entry(ies) fit inside that outline, you're good to go. Any other effort, will be judged as dicey at best. So ANY number of subjects is eligible to start with. Also recall, some of these had "development", but still will qualify even so.

Also keep in mind, while there is a "no sweeps in Special Awards" proviso in place for TriCity Thirteen, this award does offer an opportunity to the intrepid for a twin or better chance at a single entry being eligible for more than this, as conceivably you gained perspective in earlier part of this essay.

As FURTHER INCENTIVE, consider arched glass award from TC-12, on the left. See it as TC-13 trophy prototype for this Special Award. Go for it!





# SA 12 "Tasmanian Titan"

#### Award for

Best FORMULA ONE or TASMAN FORMULA Subject (car or driver)

Really want to emphasize here, as the Judges will be instructed the same on "game day", this award eligibility is more than "just F1/Formula Tasman" race cars. Entrants may sign up for consideration for this one with Busts, Figures of these Drivers, as well as their competitive cars.

There is not exactly a shortage of Australian or New Zealand drivers or race teams for either Formula One or the separate Tasman "Tasman Formula" cars. In event ties, weight will be given for Oz/NZ subjects

IT IS ALSO OPEN to ALL FORMULA ONE TEAMS NOT JUST AUSSIE/NZ cars and drivers, SO KNOW THAT TOO.

Without a doubt, short inquiry on the Internet alone will provide one material for Tasman Formula, Tasman Grand Prix, Australian Grand Prix and New Zealand Grand Prix useful references.

Which would hopefully for those not familiar with these or any aspects of F1 or Tasman racing history, prove helpful, exciting. Might be the edge to win over your competition ©

So ANY car or driver subject that fits Formula One and/Or Tasman Formula parameter, is eligible. So expect a fair amount of potential competition for this.

Also remember that if subjects end up getting Judges in quandary due to being "just so good, it's really not fair to call it anything but a two (or more) way tie". ADVANTAGE goes to the Oz/NZ subject in that case.



In event competition actually comes to pass that it's only that set of "tied finalists", the Judges will let us know their final answer.

As more incentive, consider this TC-11 arched glass award shown at right is serving as sample of TC-13 trophy for this Special.

# LOOKING BACK AT FORTY- Where's Our Prez Mr.Bill? See News @ 6

Yes, 2017 marks the 40<sup>th</sup> year for charter of IPMS/Fremont Chapter, Region Nine of the International Plastic Modeler's Society, USA aka "The Fremont Hornets" or as President/Editor likes to refer, "Free Hornets". While this Editor hasn't been a member for the entire span, he has been lucky enough to be friends with some who have. Also, known several of the Hornets who will be part of this continuing series on our history.



After reading a recent editorial in the December 1991 issue of the IMPS/Fremont newsletter, "The HUD," I am compelled to write this article. Although no names were mentioned in that editorial, it was directed at me. Since the HUD is not copyrighted, the original editorial will be reprinted here so that the membership will know where I am coming from.

#### FOR OUR EIGHTEENTH INSTALLMENT:

We left off last time with still in place as All Purpose Exec Officer Bill Andrews having closed December 1991 HUD with an Editorial which struck a nerve it would seem.

The "clip" is reprised at right, and will be also inside the "RESPONSE" from another venue to help reading

"Clip" on the left is a reprise from "preview" from immediately preceding BUZZ # 74, and I wanted the balance to start this issue's Machine on correct footing.

What you may want to keep in mind here is: Response had to be published ELSEWHERE simply because WE WOULD NOT HAVE ANOTHER "HUD" until JULY of this year 1992, and so the respondent had no choices. As you will learn, BOTH folks are "Dual Passporters" at the time. Today, one is R.I.P. and the other still Dual.

Editorial
Out of the box......What's it for anyway?

I've been to quite a few model contests in my time, and done some judging, and I thought I had an idea as to what the "out of the box" award was supposed to be about, but maybe I'm confused..... I have noticed that at a couple of recent contests at least one modeler who has considerable talent and won a number of national awards has elected to enter his projects in the out of the box category. I'm not sure why a "Master Modeler" would ask that this be done, I just hope that it isn't because it would be the quickest route to gather more trophies. In any event, I think it does a disservice to other modelers. I am aware that there is no RULE prohibiting such entries by anyone, but I think it's the spirit of the category that becomes subverted. Granted, a talented modeler may not scratchbuild or super-detail every project but most who are in that league are SELDOM satisfied not to add ONE or TWO extras, to get a little competitive edge. By entering out of the box, the master modeler is virtually eliminating the chance for the younger or less experienced competitor to get that first win and make him more likely to want to compete again instead of shaking his head and saying "How can I possibly beat a national award winner at small local contest?" Wouldn't a win like that be a little like the Chicago Bulls bearing a local high school team for a trophy and being proud of the win.......?

By entering out of the box, the master modeler is virtually eliminating the chance for the younger or less experienced competitor to aet that first win and make him more likely to want to compete against instead of shaking his head an saying, "How can I possibly beat a national award winner at small local contest?' Wouldn't a win like that be a little like the Chicago Bulls beating a local high school team for the trophy and being proud of the wind ...? Anyway, it's food for thought folks. See ya Fridayl Bill Andrews.

#### MY REPLY

I built wooden models during WWII and then quit the hobby in 1954. I started building plastic models in 1977 and Joined the San Jose IPMS chapter (San Jose Scale Modelers) in February 1984. Shortly thereafter, I entered 29 different models at an IPMS contest in Monterey. All of my entries were "out of the box" (hereafter called OOTB) as I did not have the slightest idea that there was any other way to build a model. Awards were given for 1st to 3rd (maybe 4th), as well as Honorable Mention certificates. I came home with no awards; not even an honorable mention.

Several awards were won at this contest by Bob Moore. I went over to see his 1/32nd scale Tomcat. Wow! What an airplanel How did he make all that stuff? "Scratchbuilt" was the new word I learned. I said to myself, "Someday, I want to build a model like Bob Moore." I went to every contest that year a half dozen or more - and came home emptyhanded. I kept hearing the same names: Bob Moore, Doug Sommers, etc. They were winning all the awards. Disappointed, I kept telling myself, someday I'll win an award.

One year and a lot of hard work later, I WON. It was only an Honorable Mention, but I won! A few months later, I got a 3rd place, then a 2nd, and finally a 1st at the 1985 annual Montery contest. Back then, I was a new modeler on the block. No one cared about me and gave me an award just because I was the "new kid on the block." I earned my award.

Since then, I've won over 60 awards, from Honorable Mention to 1st place. I've also won a few special awards like Best A/C, Best Bare Metal, Best USAF A/C, Best Desert Storm A/C, and Modeling Excellence. I haven't won them all, though. I've never won a Best of Show (Senior) or some the special awards at the Nationals.

Now I would like to address the specifics of Bill's editorial.

1. He states: I have noticed that at a couple of recent contests at least one modeler who has considerable talent and won a number of national awards has elected to enter his projects in the out of the box category. I have attended the Redding contest in October and the Sacramento contest in December. Before that, the last contest lentered was in February. I assume, therefore, that Redding and Sacramento are the "couple of recent contests" that Bill is writing about.

At the Redding contest, I planned to enterfour models in the following categories:

- 1. 1/48th scale F7U-3M Cutlass: 1/48th scale twin engine jet category
- 2. 1/72nd scale F-117A: Desert Storm Aircraft category
- 1/72nd scale YF-22: "Out of the box" category
- 1/72nd scale YF-23: "Out of the box" category.

At the registration table, I found out that there was no Desert Storm Aircraft

category. The Best Desert Storm Aircraft would simply be chosen from all "regular" aircraft categories. Therefore I had two choices - enter the F-117A in 1/72nd scale twin engine jet or in OOTB. I chose OOTB.

Now why did I chose OOTB? I built my F117A OOTB because I had not built anything
in this category since 1964. I did It because
I had grown tired of spending hundreds and
even thousands of hours building extremely
detailed models. I wanted to see what kind
of model I could build in less than 100 hours.

I had previously entered the F-117A in the OOTB category at the February 1991 SJSM contest. It did not win an award. You see, the Master Modeler had attached the main landing gear incorrectly. I had "forgotten" a basic. When it was pointed out to me that the landing gear had be incorrectly installed, I made sure (as Head Judge of that contest) that the judges judging that category were aware of my mistake.

At Redding, the F-117A did not win an award in the OOTB category either (even though I fixed the landing gear). It did, however, win the Best Desert Storm Aircraft award.

My YF-22 and -23 were also entered in the OOTB category at Redding. They did not win any awards either.

Although I intended to enter my Cutlass in the 1/48th scale twin engine jet category, it ended up in the OOTB category (where it won 1st place). How did this happen, you ask? For the benefit of you who did not attend, cards were not placed on the tables to show where the various models in specific categories were to be placed. I simply put my model on the first table where a member of the contest committee told me to do so. Later, I was told that models would be moved as required to put them in the proper category. Before the judging began, all models were moved at least three times. When the shuffling was completed, the Cutlass, contrary to my intentions, ended up in the OOTB category. (I'm not trying to pick on the Redding contest: I'm just relating what happened.)

Two months later, I entered the Sacramento contest. By this time, I had heard some grumbling about my models having been entered in the OOTB category. I took the four models that I had previously taken to Redding along with a fifth (model, that is), a 1732nd scale Bell X-1.

Sacramento had an OOTB category that included aircraft, armor and automobiles. I decided to enter the YF-22, YF-23, and F-117A all in the 1/72nd scale twin engine jet category, the Cutlass in the 1/

48th scale twin engine jet, and the X-1 in the 1/47th or larger jet aircraft category. Now I could have entered every one of these models in the OOTB category as they were all specifically built to meet this category's restrictions. But I didn't.

Now Bill states "I'm not sure why a "Master Modeler" would ask that this be done, I just hope that it isn't because it would be the quickest route to gather more trophies". Based on my San Jose and Redding experience, I am not sure that OOTB is necessarily the quickest or the surest route.

So, how did I fare at Sacramento? The F-117A and YF-22 got nothing, the YF-23 a 3rd, and the F7U-3M and X-1 both got 1st place awards.

So what is the "bottom line."

- 1. The OOTB category, like any other category, is open to all modelers. As long as it remains open to all modelers, then it is my perogative and the perogative of any other modeller to 1) build models subject to that categories restrictions and 2) enter models in that category.
- I am concerned by Bill's notion that somehow the standards of the OOTB category are lower than in other categories.
- 3. Any "master modeller" can be beat in any category.

<u>ALRIGHTY THEN</u> – Here we go with all the News to use!

As aforesaid, this "response" is contained within <u>SJSM</u> club's Styrene Sheet of <u>February '92</u> to read, recap as had NO HUD from the Fremont Club side of which Rodney was a member.

As Rodney points out early on, HUD Editor Bill didn't use any names, Rodney took it from the material content it was directed at him. After rereading entirety of both writer's cases, my high five to both of them for points put across without trashing or hot tempered argumentative of nature "but technically true" turns of phrase. Bill was very much onto a topic that 25 plus years later still generates a lot of aggravation and vagueness

of understanding of what intent vs results of interpretation are, namely "Out Of The Box" Rules and Category of Competition

In a way it's more the pity that we didn't have a HUD to put this reply into at the time, as although there were then as now, those who were "dual passporters" (members of both clubs) an opportunity to truly "get all the word out" was totally lost here.

Rodney's writeup brings home really many things that today as then, count for equally valid concerns that match what Bill was taking on. Which I would say more likely resonate "populist" and would frame RJW, "masters like him", as somewhat the "greedy or selfish trophy hunting elites". Whereas Rodney did strike home direct with context fully and with the "bottom line" he closed with, especially last - 3) any...can be beat... ©



IF YOU THOUGHT I WAS BEING A BIT HARSH CHARACTERIZING THINGS – NOTE Dioramas (2 categories) IS SPLIT AIRCRAFT and ALL OTHERS. SO OUT of 25 total categories "pre-split", AIRCRAFT HAVE 11 in Senior and 1 in Junior, leaving 13 to be spread out for the remainder, and of those, 3 will be in Junior so Senior categories "other than Aircraft" will be shared within the 9 left. For REGIONAL?

Well, sad to say, TODAY I have NOTHING TO REFER TO in details as to how this event turned out (winners, photos, general or specific review by individuals or clubs who were at it or involved) to give anyone an idea how "the first ever East Coast style Regional" was responded to. Only notices of direct reference to this in the MAY 1992 SJSM Styrene Sheet (AGAIN ONLY MATERIAL I CAN FIND FOR PERIOD) are a briefing in April Meeting minutes of one Rodney Williams giving one Roy Sutherland a check of \$700 for the SJ Scale Modelers share of the NINECON. One might infer from this that the Golden Gate and Fremont thusly as well, were on the hook for equal shares, and I can assure you that from my memories of the times, that would be a still steep bill for at least GG – IPMS since club was not large membership pool. Fremont had more members and was closer to SJSM in size at the time. Be all that as it may, the event WAS STAGED and FOLKS CAME TO COMPETE. I'll toss in one example to fill the page, and provide my one exception to rule "that I haven't anything for details on who won or photos of NINECON"



Bill Ferrante's 1/72nd scale Dinah by LS and winner of a 3rd in its class at NINECON (Congratulational) Previously available only from Airfix, LS brought out three variants. According to William Green's War Planes of the Second World War, Volume 3, Fighters, the Rikugun KI.46-Ill-Kai or Dinah was regarded as the "masterpiece of the Japanese aircraft industry." First flown in March 1943, the Dinah was capable of 396 mph at 19,685 ft. Originally conceived as a reconnaiseance plane, the appearance of the B-29 over Japan, the plane was quickly modified into the Type 100 Air Defense Fighter. The armament seems unusual, at least to the Editor:  $2\times20$  mm in the nose and a 37 mm inclined 60° from the horizontal. I guess you could call this the Japanese version of the German "Schräge Musik" fitted to night fighters. "Schräge Musik" meant "Jazz", but literally translated was "inclined music." The fitting of the armament reduced the top speed to 379 mph.

As a measure of its value, the Luftwaffe considered the possibility of licensing its production in Germany (now there's a variant you can build, Bill!)

As it worked out, digging further in SJSM archives of 1992 (again, thanks to Dave Sampson, Cliff Kranz and now also Rodney Williams & Bill Ferrante for making this possible) the May SJSM Meeting Minutes reveal in Business portion that:

"The President began by admonishing those award-winning modelers who failed to bring their models and trophies from the NINECON I contest. He noted it has been (or should be) a tradition of SJSM members to enjoy the ego trip of showing off the winning models and their acquired spoils. (the President at this time was "Admiral" Bert McDowell, btw)" Then Bill recorded a little later in business notations thusly:

"Rodney then reported on the financial results of the contest. Cost was approximately \$ 2767 with an income of \$ 2542, thereby netting each club with a loss of (only) \$ 75."

SO THERE IN JUNE 1992, WE HAVE IT, THE BOTTOM LINE ON OUR FIRST EVER (and so far, ONLY) "EAST COAST STYLE REGION NINE REGIONAL"

Now all these years later, there's no documentation other than that which I have cited here to even give you idea that all this "excitement" occurred. Shame really, as even a very brief two or three page review with mostly photos coming from at least the SJSM and Fremont Hornets clubs involved in the staging, who had plenty evident bits of "newsletters" in their recent pasts to have done so, would have been wondrous now

I don't know if the IPMS Golden Gate component ever had a newsletter or flyer or any other documentation re: this event or any other, but perhaps in time, I find out. More than once in a while a sage soul has commented or pontificated upon today's "internet based, digital stored, ready to be lost at moment's notice forever" history records. Here's a perfect example of "old school" situation of similar character...

#### JULY 1992 Oh my god! I must be seeing things, is that (gasp) really a FREMONT HORNETS News Document ??? Call me an ambulance

We seemed to have a ways to go in getting back at it, if you compare the same month as published from SJSM, a club several of us were even then "dual members of". Which is clearly recognized in the minutes where the upcoming meeting dates collide, as you can read inside both "documents"

#### Final Approach...




