Cliff has just completed two more lovely $1/72^{nd}$ scale Piasecki HUP "Retrievers" from newer release kit (not the fiendish Mach 2 molding this Editor and he have managed to build in past, despite the molding...).

LOOKING BACK AT FORTY- Where's Our HUD, Mr.Roy? News @ 6

Yes, 2017 marks the 40th year for charter of IPMS/Fremont Chapter, Region Nine of the International Plastic Modeler's Society, USA aka "The Fremont Hornets" or as President/Editor likes to refer, "Free Hornets". While this Editor hasn't been a member for the entire span, he has been lucky enough to be friends with some who have. Also, known several of the Hornets who will be part of this continuing series on our history.



FOR OUR NINETEENTH INSTALLMENT:

Well you may recall that we HAD NO NEWSLETTER named The HUD (or anything else) FOR first SEVEN MONTHS of 1992, which left us no clue directly from Fremont how things went for "The First Ever (and apparently LAST EVER) East Coast Style Regional Contest". With three clubs involved, it fell mostly upon SJSM to manage to give us some idea how that whole concept ended up, with ONE photograph and a smattering of data to be found in a couple of newsletters.

To recap and also further demonstrate the value of having a club publication for preserving history, here's the "Bottom Line" for the NINECON I as unofficially recorded in '92 SJSM Styrene Sheets:

IPMS Clubs Fremont Hornets, SF-Golden Gate & San Jose Scale Modelers joined forces to stage on SUNDAY April 26, 1992 a Model Show and Competition at the Union City Holiday Inn in Union City. Successfully staged by all verifiable historical evidence, in that at least one SJSMer (Bill Ferrante) had his LS Models 1/72nd scale Dinah take a third in its class as shown in photograph/caption, that several SJSMers were chastised for a lack of showing off after the event in newsletter from then President McDowell, that Rodney Williams for SJSM (but also then a Fremont modeler) reported post event the three clubs only lost 75 dollars apiece when income vs. expenses were finalized.

The true measure of how well this turned out though was to be fact that when plans for first quarter of 1993 were in serious execution mode, SJSM was clearly stating their position that "Although there has been discussion about another 'Bay Area menage a trois' in 1993, NO ONE HAS YET STEPPED FORWARD TO LEAD. If there is a joint affair in April, okay, but SJSM will have a February contest." In other words, since no one was communicating or otherwise SHOWING LEADERSHIP, NO SHOCK we never were to see another "3 Club Regional" repetition. Lesson here?

The contest calender for the rest of 1992 looks rather bleak, with only the bi-annual Sacramento contest in December. Does this mean that we are going to be inundated by contests in the spring and early summer? This hurts attendance of all contests as modelers are overwhelmed and unlikely to show up at them all. Can't all the clubs get together and plan a more sensible schedule? Enough bitching.

NEW KIT NEWS

The release last month of the DML Fokker Triplane has been reported to be very well received. Encouraging sales has DML considering

August 1992 saw finally a return to a somewhat "regular" letter from the Hornets, but not until this **September 1992** issue was there ANY words on Regional passage. *Note that "Month/Year" seems to still evade Editor Roy*

a whole line of WWI aircraft in 1/48 scale. So says the grapevine. The New DML FW190A-5 special is in the stores now, as is the Hasegawa FW190D-9 in 1/72. The just-released EA-6B Prowler from Monogram is really impressive and big. Also from Morton Grove... the retooled DC-3, also very nice. The much anticipated release of the all-new JU-88A-4 from Italeri is reported to be by the end of the month! I've been waiting for a good JU-88 for a long time. The DML DO-335's are expected next month. Has this has been the year of the Luftwaffe, or what? Again, for new armor and other stuff news, talk to Keith Lew on Friday.

KIT REVIEW

The new 1/72 Hasegawa FW190A-8, FW190A-8 R11 and the newest FW190D-9 are all first class kits and share some common sprues. As such, I will lump them together into one review. The moldings are some of the best I've seen. No flash, mold mismatch, sinkmarks, or ejector pin marks mar these releases. The surface detailing is exquisite, with fine engraved panel lines overall. The outline accuracy is very close to perfection, and the fit is almost too good to be true.

The only improvements you need to make is to scrape or file the port underfuselage area at the rear of the wingroot to improve the fit of the wing. Also, the tailwheel is fully extended, and should be shortened by about 3/64" to correct the sit. The cockpits are a little sparse, but Cooper Details will be releasing a detail set to fill that void next month. (Cleverly disguised plug) Airwaves also has a photoetched set for this kit. Detail fanatics can busy themselves with opening up exhaust ports and adding stubs, and scratchbuilding new wheelwells, as the kit ones are a little shallow and oversimplified.

The D-9 includes the regular and blown canopies. The regular canopy is the same as in the A-8's and is one of the most optically clear canopies I've seen. Unfortunately the same can not be said of the blown hood. Minor imperfections on the inside mar the finish. Some careful sanding with 47 million grit sandpaper and a coat of future should do wonders for it.

The decals are nicely done and appear to be accurate with the exception of the 190D-9 with the red and white striped undersurfaces. The number given is "white 1", which is a bogus scheme. The only three known D-9's had red numbers with white outlines, one being "red 13". There is a beautiful decal sheet for the D-9 from MSAP with 5 colorful schemes. MSAP's next releases will include a sheet for A-8's in 1/72 and 1/48.

At \$14.00 these kits are not cheap, but I strongly feel that they are worth it. They are a pleasure to build and look fantastic when completed. If you plan to build a bunch, you may want to get them from a discount mail-order place, to cut the costs. As you can tell, I like these kits. Now, how about a line of 1/72 Spitfires from Hasegawa...

MODELLING HINTS AND TIPS

Unless you are building a model that will have a high gloss or natural metal finish, don't waste your time sanding down to 2000 grit sandpaper. Anything past 600 grit is a waste of time, as the first coat of paint will fill those tiny imperfections. If you love sanding, on the other hand, knock yourself out!


FINAL APPROACH

NEW KIT NEWS



KIT REVIEW



This is basically a reissue of the Trimaster A-8, one of the best 48th kits ever produced, with a couple of new sprues of parts. One to replace the white metal parts found in the Trimaster release, and the other with parts specific to the A-5, namely Tropical and special intakes, twin 20mm gunpacks, and the earlier MG17 upper cowl. A new decal sheet for two a/c is also included. Unfortunately, DML dropped the ball on this release.

The upper cowl is basically correct in shape but the gun breech blisters are way to small. The Twin



gunpacks are a little off in shape, the undercut to clear the flaps being missing (see diagram). Also misshapen are the special intakes, which should not taper at the



front lip. They should look like open coffee cans. Fortunately, none of thse problems are too difficult to fix. Don't get me wrong, this is a very

worthwhile kit of an important variant.

The box art is a stunning rendition of Hermann Graff's colorful mount by Koike Shigeo. The kit decals are well done for this bird, the research seems correct. The alternate scheme, "black 13", however, is full of errors. It did not have special intakes, it had inner gear doors and early style wheels (not supplied), no outer wing-mounted guns, and to top it all off, the markings are all buggered up. MSAP will be releasing the correct markings for this aircraft in about six weeks, with markings for 3 or 4 more A-5s on a new 1/48th sheet. Happy Happy!! Joy Joy!!

FINAL APPROACH

See you at Fridays meeting, where I promise to keep the talk of FW-190s to a bare minimum. If anyone would like to submit a handwritten or typed kit review of any kind, I would greatly appreciate it. Otherwise, there is always the DML TA-152H to review.... That's not a threat, that's a promise!!!

KIT REVIEW

MINICRAFT F6F-3/5 HELLCAT, KIT NO. 2121, 1/72 SCALE. \$7.00

Many years ago, shortly after the earth cooled, Minicraft announced a series of WWII pacific war aircraft. Well, the Hellcat has finally arrived. Compared to the bloated F4F and TBF, the kit's a jewel. Comparing the kit parts to Squadrons U.S. NAVY CARRIER FIGHTERS OF WWII, the kit scales perfectly in wingspan, and very close in length. The only glaring error is in the profile of the vertical fin, which companies seen to have a lot of trouble with. It is easily corrected with some sheet styrene, crazy glue, and a flexi-file.

Consisting of around 40 parts, the kit is obviously a clone of the Hasegawa F6F-3/5, but with some very important differences. The surface detail is all recessed. (Happy-Happy! Joy-Joy!), and the wings are split across the mean aerodynamic chord line. This makes it a lot easier to resposition ailerons, flaps, and rudder (Hint Hint - Double clue!). In addition, you get some side console detail that gets glued to the sidewalls. Personnally, I would recommend replacing this with sheet styrene strip, bar stock, and wire. Or, you could use the excellent Eduard photoetched cockpit detail set available from Squadron. The kit instrument panel is represented by applying a decal to an otherwise flat board. This results in a rather convincing representation of the real thing-NOT!!

This kit, like all others, has good points and bad points. On the plus side, the engine and airscrew are very cleanly molded, and the sliding portion of the canopy is separate from the windscreen. An interesting addition to the kit are tiny lights on the clear sprue meant to be added after painting the model. The tailhook is also a separate piece. You also get some rockets to hang under the wings for the -5 version, and they are quite useable. Remember that late -5's had metal covering on the flap undersides, so check your references carefully.

On the minus side, the trailing edges are a bit thick, and the fabric ribbing on the control surfaces is a little too pronounced. The canopy is a bit thick, and is best replaced by a vacuformed one. There are several raised rivets on the forward fuselage and tail. These are Dzus fasteners and should actually be slightly recessed (oops!). Detail in the wheel wells is minimal to say the least. The sway braces on the drop tank are overscale and should be replaced. Finally, the wing/fuselage saddle should be filed down a bit to improve the fit in this area. In all fairness, it should be pointed out that all these things are rather easily corrected by the average modeler, with the possible exception of the wheel wells.

Overall, for seven bucks, this is a pretty nice kit, especially when compared to the Wildcat and Avenger from Hell. Given that the Hasegawa kit is now over ten dollars, it would be interesting to see how well this kit sells. Overall, a totally log kind of kit and highly recommended!





KIT REVIEW



DEHAVILLAND VAMPIRE FB.5 HOBBYCRAFT 1/48 SCALE

Well, after 1 year of patient waiting, the Hobbycraft Vampire arrived on the market with all the hype of the new Batman Movie. I couldn't wait to build a series of this totally cool jet fighter. An FB.5, perhaps a two-seat trainer, perhaps... Then reality set in. Put bluntly, the kit stinks.

Starting with the overall proportions, the kit is okay in span and length, but in the contours, the kit's a disaster. First off, the fuselage is perfectly round, instead of the flattened bottom of the real thing. (Attaching the model to a six-foot string and dragging it behind your car at sixty miles an hour will fix this problem. In profile, the aft fuselage is okay, but the nose is way too bulbous, Looking more like the nose of a Sea Venom than a Vampire. In plan view, the forward fuselage is way too wide, tapering to a Bulbous shape too far forward (the forward fuselage on the Vamp is more or less flattened on the sides) The canopy rails are mistakenly cast away from the sides of the cockpit sills - I think the pattern maker mistook them for aerodynamic strakelets. By contrast, the canopy is not too bad.

The cockpit has some snazzy vertical panels for the side consoles and a fairly nice instrument panel. The control stick resembles a broomstick handle, and you get an elevator trim wheel that looks like an ashtray.

The wings are more or less okay in plan view (but 9" too far forward- Ed. Well, really, my name isn't Ed, it's Roy), but the wheelwells taper to too narrow a shape for the wheel cutout. The wheels themselves resemble that of a Hot Wheels car, but at least they are round. The intake at the wingroot is nothing more than a gaping hole, but at least it

isn't the patented Venetian blind style of intake found on the supposed 1/48 Glencoe Venom.

Moving to the empennage, the tail booms...er ...well, they're...tail booms. The bullet fairings that the stab and rudder blend into, aren't even close. At least they're symmetrical.

As you can probably guess, I'm not to thrilled with this kit. However, it does have one good point. The wingtips are separate pieces, and I'm using them for blister-type bomb racks on my Spitfire XVIII. As far as I can figure out, when Hobbycraft copies some company that did it's homework (like the F-89s' or the BF-109 series), the results are pretty good. On the other hand, when they go it alone, the results are pretty mediocre. If Hobbycraft intends to make all of their British aircraft this bad (witness the Spit 14 or the Seafire 15), I wish they would step aside, and let somebody like Airfix or Emhar do them. At least they would look like the real thing.

MODELLING HINTS

In an earlier issue, I stated that finish sanding much past 400 grit was a waste of time. This applies only to Enamels such as Modelmaster and Pactra. If using the new acrylics such as Tamiya (my new favorite) or Gunze, you will need to go to 600 or 800 grit, and a quick polish with a heavy cloth. The acrylics are a much finer paint and will not as readily cover minor blemishes.


