Sir Francis Drake's Golden Hind joined the USCG training ship Eagle to represent proudly the ships of sail, in scale.






The 1944 Bedford QLD truck in all its purposeful 1/35th scale glory.

Yellow accents of this 1/32nd scale BF-110 attracted me to it.




As did the scheme of this N1K2.

As further evidence that Editor could only seem to see bright colored aircraft at the Sonoma show, here's the best picture he has of the "Ole Yeller" that was famous civilian P-51D mount of Bob Hoover. Converted lovingly from the Tamiya 1/48 kitting.





Not often seen together at contest tables, due to one being propeller and the other jet engine driven, it warranted pictures for that alone.

Here is the glorious Northrops in $1/72^{nd}$ scale presence hugely, the Category here being simply Air Craft, 1/72 and smaller.

Now feast on sight of the XB-35 Eight Prop original next to a later Eight TurboJet refit as the YB-49



Another 4 engine silver beauty who happened to also be in this same category of competition, was this Lockheed C-121 of the USAF. Upper left of this, another soon to be clear favorite of the Editor, in the 1/48th scale aircraft category, from the USN.









There is just something charming and reassuring about this "comfortably used finish" Gull Gray and White Corsair, why I took so many shots of it. A 1/48th scale pleasure to take in. Now, a reminder of its competition, including an F-86D!









Now again, a chance for one who has judged aplenty to be relaxing and thanking model gods that he wasn't facing the unenviable task of finding 3 top finishers in 1/48th aircraft. Here I was just taking pictures of pair of lovely Airacobras, USN F3H Demon, USAF F-86D, as along with the Corsair, Mustang, Helldiver, Hurricane and few others ALL compete together for that ranking. Bless those who had to do this job.



Not that the other aircraft category judges were exactly lying in fields of clover with their choices, as I'll briefly sample for you

As here is four of the subjects to rank against one another in $1/72^{nd}$ and smaller aircraft. The two Flying Wings could provide shelter for the Fokker Triplane in the same scale with room to spare for several other competitors, not to mention that the Su-30 twinjet also had same footprint, being all of $1/144^{th}$ in scale. I didn't take note at the end of day who won in most cases, either.









The 1/32nd scsle Aircraft facing off included this mouthy F-80C Shooting Star which had the yellow wasp nosed Bf-110 shown earlier and the pugnacious red nosed G.B. R-1 as two competitors among several.

Selfishly glad to have been arriving so late in the schedule that day to not be able to join in judging.

Mind you, the turnout of models was plenty and consistently high in quality percentage wise, also.

Nice "problem" if you're the hosting chapter or the appreciative audience, not so much if you're the one who has to be part of team to pick out the Winners for that day.

As ever, if you're in the mood to help out a contest crew, the single biggest assist is to be learning to judge or practicing it when you do.





Meanwhile, in Dioramas you would find yourself with this sort of generous range in subjects to assess and rank.







The turnout in Automotive categories didn't prove any less challenging, and pleasing variety to look at indeed.









In the Fantasy Figures category, movie characters again tended to dominate even if in ways not necessarily related at all to their original role in casting. Even that

Velociraptor is in fact a member of the category, being the Jurassic Park rendition of the actual dinosaur, just saying.

This fighter craft from later Star Wars movie always catches my eye on tables, yet I still can't recall what it's called!


Below, two examples of how much this Disney movie influenced Jules Verne's Nautilus submarine gets royal treatment when it comes to display bases.

the more "techie" of the two at the show.








When someone takes on a creative flight such as this one and succeeds largely on the main premise for competition in category, it's often helpful to just have some big picture and small picture references to illustrate points for one's self and for others.



The creator had taken the roof pieces off which did make the entire story telling much easier to read and also judge both quantity and quality of work here.

The Bot Shop's creator helpfully provided a little insight into what it took to put this assemblage together, namely over 50 kits worth of parts used in some way, with modifications in most cases. Over 40 robots, walkers, flying vehicles or trucks in piece, and the building is not only 3 HO scale buildings combined there's also a Mir Space Station as part of architecture. 15 months of fun for the entrant getting this idea into what you see here. Don't know if it won anything, but it does tell quite a big story.



Stay tuned as I will have another small gallery of shots taken by an interested bystander who made it possible for me to have seen it all.




