This BRG (color ref) Ford engine Lotus F-1, a true classic to me. No small feat getting that Indy car on table, and props for doing the "old auto"







There were a splendid number and variety of same scale Pickup Trucks at this show. I really do enjoy the 3 dimensional artistry in play here. Matters not if you like the subject at all, to me, one has to be appreciative of the effort and execution in something such as this.

It looks real, it looks like real life, it looks like it's seen its share of days gone by and will have some more yet. Details abundant, all cohesive, subtle and not, just a treat. 







Things go better with Coke was the old advertising slogan, and this manages to model it nicely. Modelling miniatures of real life everyday items is not as easy as rolling out of bed, give it try and see. One consideration for why, because these items are part of our existence in a familiar and basic organic (as in part of your overall, as opposed to "made of living flesh") manner, you will tend to notice even slight imperfections of the expected when presented with the final product, and missing or misshapen components will stand out hugely.

In any case, this particular Chevy PU with "cargo" along with neighbor in blue with the office desk in back, are well executed "familiar items" to me












Preceding page was a trifecta of one rare Bell in USN colors. The Airacomet P-59 saw lots of folks give her a whirl, the later model squared tip version is pretty enough in training colors. This would be outshined though in the early version (rounded tips) USN bird that was in the sweet "tri color" scheme (2 blues and white). This great 1/48th kitting offers both schemes in two different issues if you can find them.

Above is a fine VX-4 Tomcat in "Black Bunny" scheme that is a trademark of this squadron, and again in 1/48th, a great scale yes.

This MiG-31 Foxhound in same scale is gorgeous machine too/



Just like the P/F-82 Twin Mustang is all new material, only resembling the earlier family member, so it is with the MiG-31, not really an "upgrade" Foxbat MiG-25. It's a lot more machine and far more deadly, taking in lessons learned and the technology gains in years between the two designs.




"The Last Gunfighter" is one nickname for the Vought Crusader, and she is a wicked lovely air warrior in my book, that earned all her stars







The DeHavilland of Canada company has made many craft that intrigue me, and Matchbox made one of their best kits in 1/72 using DHC Twin Otter as basis. Thus anytime I see one done, I tend to try to get shots. These are two of my best for this one. Kit allows for land, float or ski gear configure.



I just happened to like how this pair looked and the sense that the water was "alive".

The next two shots following are because the Aurora "Skipjack" was my first submersible fascination, and this better rendition of the famous "secret USN attack sub" brings that all back for me.





 $The \ USN \ scored \ mightily \ with \ 3^{rd} \ ship \ named \ Skipjack. \ \textit{Radix Nova Tridentis "Root of the New Sea Power"} \ was \ a \ motto \ she \ lived \ fully, \ 1959-1990$





The Riverine Patrol Boats of the USN, another far from well known or appreciated combat historical aspect. I don't know the origin of kit here or much about the machine. I just find them interesting when I run across them.

The group below is being featured in part as a favor to readers who have encouraged me to highlight biplanes, fabric and rigged aeronautica. So here There was not a lot this time out, but what was there was good, they gave a slice of history from different years and applications, they are a nice look



I will provide a bit of data or color commentary as best I can, otherwise, just pass through in review or skip ahead to the end...

This Albatros D.3 of "The Great War" in the German Air Service, is a color commentary all its own. Really liked the wood propeller achievement







For thirteen years of my life, I had the distinct pleasure of being a volunteer docent at an air museum, which has on site a licensed, working wooden propeller shop. One of my favorite tours to take visitors on was "making the prop shop come to life", as most times I worked no one was actually at the task. It then was a 40 hour apprenticeship to even become someone who could in fact, but I was graced with on the job learning enough to make a good basic knowledge for imparting to those visiting, by those who knew, over those years. One propeller I saw in stages from start to finish was for a replica Fokker D-7. So, the Albatros here in some ways, brings all that back to me, it's not just well crafted plastic modelling, it's all sorts of thing.



Speaking of Fokkers, here we find one picture that turned out for me that's a cousin of the plane whose prop I bore witness to birth of.

I don't have any information on the particulars of the mural across the fuselage, only can say that's one big reason I took the shots of this plane.

Okay we'll jump now a few years later in time, where the Boeing Company provided the USN Air Service with a very capable carrier based fighter that likely would have shredded the likes of the Albatros and Fokker. The design was nicely thought out and served for USAAC needs as well...





And here we are, with my friend Felix the Cat running his iconic lit fuse bomb on the fuselage of the first USN aircraft & squadron to have him as a mascot, "Fighting 6" and the Boeing F4B-4. Later, during WW2, Fighting 6 and "The Shooting Stars" Fighting 3 would end up swapping their VF designations, causing a 3 year controversy about who held the rights to claim Felix. It ended up with the Chief of Naval Ops ruling during 1946 that Shooting Stars now numbered VF-3A would be his home. In 1948 they became VF-31 "Tomcatters", carrying Felix into many a battle as duty called. In 2006 they became VFA-31, and are still flying today with feisty Felix proudly adorning their Super Hornets. To wrap this somewhat all around, it is now possible to see a "Fighting 6" Felix the Cat F4B in a museum today, although it's actually a USAAC version (the P-12) made over to look the part for Naval Aviation Museum in Pensacola, FL. Not so unusual, the "Martin B-10" in USAF Museum is a converted export 139W from Argentina



Another biplane, another Boeing success story. This time, it's superb Primary Trainer 17, which could take all the guff Student pilots could dish.



Of course, the aircraft is also known as the Stearman, for good reason. Lloyd Stearman designed this as a bet on a great need of the USAAC for a sturdy training aircraft upcoming. Boeing acquired his Stearman Aircraft Company in 1934, just in time to take full advantage of the success of the design. By the time the planes really started rolling out in early 1941, the "Stearman Division" label disappeared entirely it was an all Boeing plane...



Alright, we wrap back around again as we move fully into World War Two, with another German biplane, the Henschel Hs-123. This bird was so successful in doing its job as a dive bomber/ground attack vehicle, that in January 1943 a German commander asked if more could be produced! Alas, production had ceased in 1940, no jigs were saved. Hs-123s continued to serve until 1945, though. Well, one more shot and I wrap this up.

One more look at this 1/25th scale Logger, then a pleasing bit of news to follow. Yuba City had said they'd be back at end of show. It's confirmed 😌
