Nice closed wheel racer here from Mike Meek. Again, Editor didn't keep up with the conversations underway to get any details here for this.








Ben Pada is showing well what can be made of Eduard's P-51D Mustang in Ben's scale, 1/48. So nice to have so many choices in D Mustangs!

After reviewing in short order where VP/Treasurer David Parks had brilliantly brought us, more up to date than last the Contest Director knew, all the furious behind the scenes effort of recent weeks since our last Nest: The President (and Con Director) Burton along with VP tried to get an agreement to formally adopt plan for 5 November 2022 to host our 5 years delayed TC-14. After some contentious discussion and review of known calendar and basically unknowable 2023 (besides those confirmed NNL in January, SilverCon 2023 in June) the officers agreed to a 24 hour hiatus for RC Chris to confirm that no clubs would be put out with our date this year. Alternative as presented clearly by Director, was instead we could just forgo 2022 due dates unavailable or practical with firm idea that likely our 2023 costs would go beyond likely affordability, again dates would be just as contentious. SILVERCON '22 A Second & Longer Look At First R-9 Show of Year

June 25 2022 Reschedule proved to be no problem in getting a good turnout of modelers and vendors in place of original February show date. Only two weeks after the also rescheduled 2022 NNL West, this "45th Anniversary of Star Wars" themed event provided lots to do and see. Above a look at what ended up winning the Best of Show, deservedly so in my opinion as well as concretely decided by hard working Judges. More on this ahead



For now, the Editor will be focusing on particular interesting bits that intrigued him and he gave only a swift short look at in last issue's article. Such as this very obscure and very well executed model subject in Rotary Wing category. I had no idea this kit existed and barely knew of the bird's manufacturer, although I am sure plenty of helicopter folk aren't so ignorant. Kellett AutoGiro Company of USA produced the first successful Rotary Wing aircraft adopted for service by the US Army (USAAC/F). The YG-1B and follow-on XO-60 were 7 lots each, bought and employed in between years 1935 to 1942. Those were an Autogyro. By 1944, Kellett was developing the twin rotor, tail rotorless concept (trying to make a faster helo was the goal) which resulted in the XR-8. XR-10 seen here was a direct response for troop carrier/cargo capable machine that was all metal skinned, not fabric and sheet metal over steel tube as contemporaries or the XR-8 from which it was developed out of. At time, it was largest in the world of type!


While a very worthwhile endeavor, this machine capable of carrying 10 troops plus crew of 2, or same with 1100 lbs (500kg) cargo, was to suffer the same problem as predecessor. That of the non rigid rotors, enmeshed, striking one another in operation. With experience gained trying to do a two vs three non rigid rotor on the XR-8 proving unworkable, plus any rigid rotor system demanding extensive redesign, the XR-8 was basically accepted to service trials only to end up a museum item immediately instead. The XR-10 sadly, had a control failure in flight killing the chief test pilot for Kellett and I find no record of either of two built surviving to become museum pieces. Thus we have only this 1/72 LF scsle model kit as a means to know it.



To further help put this machine's revolutionary place in aero history better, please note that this craft was flying in spring of 1947, it's predecessor taking to air in August 1944. So one might imagine the appearance of such craft to casual or accidental observer, as well as the engineering challenge

Also, be advised those aren't early turbojets powering the XR-10 here. Those shaft driven intermeshing 3 blade rotors run off the work of twin radial 9 cylinder conventional piston motors in those nacelles. Can't confirm construction for this machine, but realize also that predecessor XR-8 had rotors made of plywood ribs and skin on a steel tube, not something that would take lightly colliding with one another. Most likely same for XR-10.





So there you have it, something to compare with those sleek and oh so capable Sikorsky (Blackhawk), Bell (Hueycobra) tail rotor designs nearby, several generations past this pioneer.


Kaman in the USA and Kamov in the East are the only ones now that come to mind succeeding in using this intermeshed, tail rotorless helicopter concept in several production models.

The rigid rotor technology was also pursued to success with Lockheed being an early leader. Though its efforts starting with the 1959 Model CL-475, then the XH-51/51A leading into the underappreciated revolutionary AH-56A Cheyenne of 1967-72 only ended up taking them out of the helicopter business. But others like the MBB Bo-105 today are examples of success in this rigid rotor system concept. Kellett was on right track...



Speaking of tracks, here we have the Collections category at Silvercon 2022, and though only two entry there's one that wins Editor's heart for sure.

While the 1/72nd armored vehicles group has met and passed the minimum number/theme requirements for "Collections" entry set by the USA Nats, both these entries meet the happily relaxed at local level terms for this category at SilverCon. For the USA Nats, your entry must be no less than 5, and closely related by a stated theme. For this show, it's minimum three subjects and related by stated theme. The Editor was charmed by the grand quad of one of his favorite Soviet armored vehicles, the SU-100, which was the sole theme. 1/16th, 1/35th, 1/72nd and 1/144th scale examples of this.



This 1/16th SU-100 was nicely presented, being done in WW2 scheme with simple "Soviet Green" overall color, plain (no otline, no accents) Red star and white ID numerals, and placed in a base that shows it employed as they often enough were, as a lowered profile fixed position anti-tank gun with superior crew protection, albeit limited arc in X-Y-Z axes. While it is dubious at best that, in fact, all the hatches seen here would be open at the same time, especially with not a soul present anywhere, this is a model and I am sure the modeler wants to show off the work to best advantage.



As you may or may not surmise, this machine is based on durable and itself also long lived, T-34 design.

Preceded by the SU-85, which was good proving out the design idea, but pretty much obsoleted by the T-34/85 which mounted the same 85mm gun on a moveable turret, so back at it designers went which got this 100mm gun triumph as result.

The SU-100 became a favorite as it was proven to be able to neutralize <u>any</u> German tank with this gun up to the introduction of the Tiger II.

Remaining in production in USSR until 1947 and in Czechoslovkia, in to the 1950s, made sure abundant supply of this machine existed.

Now nearly 80 years since coming to pass, this vehicle still being seen in active use as late as 2015 Yemen conflict, and 2016 there again with a Youtube video showing one being taken out by an anti-tank missile.

Pretty good testimony to mission success in design philosophy, eh?


Also would seem to offer larger potential if one was to do research, to enter as a collection at Nats with all sorts of post WW2 usages, and to wrap up, note the SU-100 is on active duty with Vietnam and North Korean government armed services

Yes, now abruptly switching over to another favorite of the Editor, this F-82 Twin Mustang. This is a 1/48th edition of the Night Fighter version "G"





And NOW we give some looks at Best of Show Winner at Silvercon 2022, reminding you the theme was "45th Anniversary of Star Wars" the movie This is a scratchbuilt entry, identified as "Star Wars Blockade Runner", scale 1/144 (which is handy, as lot of 1/144 models of all types for contrast)




Otherwise, the sheer immensity of some of these vehicles if they existed, is sometimes difficult to gauge/appreciate. Below, the Blockade Runner is accompanied by a Y-wing fighter in 1/72nd scale. You can try to imagine that half its size to match the Blockade Runner, or double the apparent size of the Runner to make compare to the Y-wing. But many of you might better be able to gain feel of either if say, a P-51 or Fw-190 in match scale is



were nearby instead. The former are not hard to come across in 1/1 scale, the latter are knowable same in museum settings, and both in mode form in either scale are pretty well familiar to many modelers or spectators alike. So being able to imagine what either of these would be like in 1/1 more in reach with such a means. Or, if you like, a pretty good number of maritime vessels and military vehicles exist in 1/1, 1/72nd and 1/144th for a similar exercise. Just saying, as I think it's fun to have something to bring the "fantastic world" into the "real" in that way, sometimes. Anyways.

The builder of this Blockaade Runner helpfully brought along a "brag book" to expand the information gained when looking at this finished work



While originally I had these two shots on single pages, it now makes more sense to be bowing to sense, shrink to a combo shot on one page

While you are taking these in, you may have a sense of that there's something of an awfully familiar shape near.

We'll explore that more in some future article perhaps. For now, leave it to fact that many know a lot of Star Wars movie vessels be owing lot of detail to kits of WW2 German Armor and various scale model plastic warships, among other sources.



So if Obi Wan Kenobi and others can continue on in "spiritual form" as The Force be with them, wouldn't in the least be a surprise if somehow C.L. Johnson were to channel his legendary design mojo in the far far future...

But yes I digress, please pay attention to the 1/144 Blockade Runner on your viewing screen.



AS WE SWITCH DIRECTLY NOW to the very core of the show theme, namely the "THEME" category table, which has some on target entries While the majority of entries seemed to be X-Wings, there were others and I'll let them explain themselves better than I might, as we go:







I would provide a bit of data or color commentary if I wasn't so abysmally ignorant of most of the coda and canon, as Star Wars for me was mostly the first 3 movies as they first came out, The 4th film made me smile as it felt more like "Pearl Harbor / 1941 (Belushi edition)" in space, with this apparently just as annoying many others as to me, "Binks" character in story for some reason I have forgotten.



These X Wings really made me smile, as it was quite a nice up ending of the usual canon based material and done in healthy fun spirit in my take.






